BENEFACTORS VISIT FIRELANDS MUSEUM TO VIEW NEW DISPLAY

ne of the finest collections of prehistoric Native American artifacts in Ohio is housed in the Archaeological Research Room of the Firelands Historical Society, located in their Laning-Young Building at 9 Case Street, Norwalk. A major portion of these artifacts were collected by Berwell Thomas in the early 1900's, and continued by his son, Elmslie Thomas. By the mid 1950's, the entire Thomas collection numbered nearly 30,000 pieces, and were stored in an old building once used as a doctor's office east of Norwalk.

After Elmslie's death, the collection passed to his two nephews and a niece. One of those nephews, Capt. Richard Black, along with his wife, Midge, donated his portion of the collection to the

Firelands Historical Society to be preserved and used for educational purposes.



Along with this, an endowment fund was established to fund and promote the new Archaeological Research Room.

As part of its ongoing program to grow and expand the Archaeological Research Room experience, Beth Sage, a local artist noted for her realistic mural paintings in area schools and institutions, was hired to create a mural on one wall of the Research Room continued on page 2:


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depicting an Archaic Period Native American village scene of approximately 5,000 years ago. This mural was completed in early 2017. Shortly after, the Black Family gave approval to contract with Life Formations in Bowling Green, Ohio to create a realistic life form representing an Archaic Period Native American hunter. The life form was completed in August of 2017 and was put on display with the mural, making a strikingly realistic display.

On October 19th, Capt. and Mrs. Black made their annual visit to Norwalk from their retirement home in Florida. Members of the board of the Firelands Historical Society were on hand to greet the Blacks at the Research Room as they were shown the display that they so generously funded, for the first time. They were pleased with the new display and approved the addition of another life form, most likely a female Native American of the Archaic Period along with a child or infant. Recently, local 4th and 5th grade classes have toured the Archaeological Research Room and have come away amazed at how realistic the display is. The Black Family's wish to promote education of prehistoric Native American people is coming true. It is a great educational experience for anyone.

Student Tour

In late October, the 4th and 5th grade students from St. Paul Catholic School visited the museum to learn about Native Americans in Ohio and the United States. Board Members, Matt Burr and John Schumm presented instructive information about these Native Americans and how the items they used correlate with those found in our museum collection. New Addition to our Military Collection

A small section of the first National Flag of the 25th Ohio Volunteer Infantry was recently donated to the Firelands Museum by David Trumble, a descendant of Edward C. Culp, a Civil War Veteran. The National Colors were carried through 13 engagements including the Battle of Gettysburg. Seven color bearers were shot under the flag. The flag piece was owned by Edward C. Culp, who participated in these engagements, and later served as Huron County Sheriff. Mr. Culp eventually



left Norwalk and settled in Salina, Kansas where he remained active in various activities, and in 1893 served as secretary for the Chicago's World's Fair. In the collection received was a letter of special interest written to his friend and later wife, Lucy Preston, the granddaughter of Samuel Preston (builder of our museum house). In the letter Edward gives details concerning the Battle of Gettysburg. Another letter was written by a Confederate soldier to Lucy. She had written the letter to her cousin, Fred Wickham, and apparently in his hast to move on had left the letter behind.

This flag joins a section of another flag in our collection believed to have been issued in 1864 when the 25th Veteran Volunteer Infantry re-enlisted. That flag piece was given several years ago by descendants of Samuel Wildman. They can both be viewed together on the wall in our museum gun room.



Bicentennial Scavenger Hunt
