Chasing grandpa: 75 years later



World War II. Normandy. Utah Beach. D-Day. These are all events that many people today know only because of mandatory history courses in school. The reality is that these events are very real to many — those 495,000 World War II veterans (16 million Americans served) still living today and the families of those living as well as of those now gone. Many veterans of World War II as well those who saw action at other times are reluctant to share their memories. Memories can be painful. Veterans may think their service was just something they had to do. Fortunately for us, some did share — in writing if not verbally. Such was the case of Dale Ebinger, who landed on Utah Beach on June 6, 1944. His experiences were and inspiration to his grandson Eric, a lifelong student of history. Thus when Eric and his wife Misty, a social studies teacher, had the opportunity to take a Smithsonian tour to England and France as part of the 75th Anniversary of D-Day, they packed their cameras and made the journey. Where Dale went, they went. Prepare to be impacted when Eric shares his experiences.

Through videos and photos, we will go to Utah Beach and

Omaha Beach as well as follow the troops before and after D-Day.

Here are just three sites to stir your interest or conjure memories of times gone by. Admission is modest. #### The **New London Area Historical Society** has them!

You can explore curiosities and historic memorabilia from the greater New London vicinity. Located in a storefront (the former NAPA and previous Burner & Sutherland Hardware), the museum has hosted clubs, groups and organizations since its 1985 inception.

Search their collection of yearbooks for photos of your relatives and friends. An Eagle Scout project by Adam Kitts enabled the museum to display scores of NLHS trophies. Kevin Phillips followed that project with the

restoration of an upper floor room.

You won't need your old Sears catalog when you visit the *Fairfield Museum*. But, the familiar sight of a two-seater outhouse may recall less-than-fond memories of trips in the dark to use one. Memorabilia from the electric railway, scrapbooks, photo albums and an Edison phonograph will capture your interest.

North Fairfield began as a settlement in the early 1800s, and was a booming metropolis during most of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. Now a sleepy little village, the museum--located in the Chapman Home, a charming 1841 house--is a treasure to be explored with post cards and photos augmenting loaned or donated memorabilia.
